Suggested Activities

- Ask students to create a visual representation (a poster, drawing or digital artwork) that encapsulates their understanding of an environmental theme of their choice. This will serve as a creative outlet for their reflections.
- Post-lt note exercise: Have students write an environmental issue of their choice on a Post-lt note and place these on the classroom board or wall. Students can read out their note and say a few words about it, if they wish, as they place it. The notes can be gathered, collated and formed into a presentation for later use.
- Complete Worksheet 1 on the Global Compact on Education, included below (p. 5).
- Complete Worksheet 2 on *Laudato Si*', included below (p. 6).
- Conduct a brief prayer service or prayer moment as included below (p. 4).
- Use the PowerPoint presentation that accompanies this resource.
- Divide students into small groups and assign each group a specific excerpt from *Laudato Si'* that addresses a different theme the relationship between humans and nature; the impact of consumerism on the environment; the duty of wealthier nations to support poorer communities; intergenerational solidarity, etc.
- Have a quick brainstorming session where students share what they know about environmental issues. Write their responses on a whiteboard.
