Thursday: Life to the Full, for and with Others





Introduction

'Saint Francis is the example par excellence of care for the vulnerable and of an integral ecology lived out joyfully and authentically. He is the patron saint of all who study and work in the area of ecology, and he is also much loved by non-Christians. He was particularly concerned for God's creation and for the poor and outcast. He loved, and was deeply loved for his joy, his generous self-giving, his openheartedness. He was a mystic and a pilgrim who lived in simplicity and in wonderful harmony with God, with others, with nature and with himself. He shows us just how inseparable the bond is between concern for nature, justice for the poor, commitment to society, and interior peace.' (Pope Francis, *Laudato Si*', 10)

Suggested Activities

- Have students write things they can do in the service of others on Post-It notes. Display these notes on the classroom wall or prayer space. A random selection of these could be read out loud or compiled into a presentation.
- Have students consider who the 'important others' are in their lives. Each student could choose one of their important others and consider how best to help this person live their life to the full.
- Complete Worksheet 1 on social justice issues, included below (p. 4).
- Complete Worksheet 2 on economic justice, Included below (p. 5).
- Organise mini-workshops where students can engage in role-playing scenarios. Each student can take on a character that represents a different experience of homelessness (a teenager couch-surfing, a refugee in direct provision, etc.).
- Have students create art, poetry or digital media projects that reflect their understanding of homelessness and social justice.
- Conduct a brief prayer service or prayer moment as included below (p. 3).
- Explore the diversity in your school. Take a survey on how many nationalities are represented. Consider whether your school is welcoming, and how the school could improve in this regard.
- Invite speakers from local organisations that work with homeless populations, such as social workers, advocates or individuals with lived experiences of homelessness.
- Explore the stigma associated with homelessness. Discuss societal perceptions and the challenges faced by homeless individuals, particularly focusing on refugees and those in direct provision.
- Facilitate group discussions on topics such as 'What does it mean to be homeless?' and 'How can society better support those experiencing hidden homelessness?'
