Mystery of God

Connecting with Scripture

Consider

How to model and nurture our friendships through the example provided by Jesus.

Explore

Kalem was sent to the kitchen to help his sister Leah with her homework while Mum was preparing the dinner. Kalem didn't really want to help Leah because he wanted to go out to kick a ball before it got dark. Leah was ready to start crying as she was tired after her day in the junior class. Kalem took her book and instead of helping Leah to do the work, he did it for her, matching the words to the pictures. Leah wasn't happy with this as she wanted to do it herself so she was getting upset. Kalem felt sorry for Leah and rubbed out the work that he had done in Leah's book. He then showed Leah how to match the first word to a picture by sounding out the word first.

Next day, when Kalem was in his class, the teacher from Leah's class came to his classroom and asked him to go to Leah's class. Leah was standing waiting for Kalem. Kalem thought he was in trouble. Then Leah's teacher said to Leah: 'You may start now, Leah.' Leah walked over to Kalem and took his hand and said to the class: 'Kalem is my show and tell. I want to show my brother to you because he helped me with my homework yesterday.' Kalem was very happy and very proud. He bent down and gave Leah a hug while everyone clapped.

Discuss

- How do you feel when you are asked to do something for someone else when you want to go and play?
- Who needed help in Kalem's house? (Leah and Mum)
- Why did Kalem rub out the work he had done?
- What difference did his kindness make to Leah?
- How would you feel if that happened to you?
- How could you do something like this in our class?
- How can you help others to do and be their best?
- When did you last tell someone in your class that you thought that they had done something well or kind?

Tuesday: Life to the Full in Our Faith Community

Background for Teacher

Family is the first place where children learn their values and where faith is chosen as a gift for them. It is important that we all connect with the parish community if our friendship with Jesus is to grow as we grow. What do you know about your parish?


Explore:

God from the Bible, see the bread and wine being changed into the Body and Blood of Jesus through the actions of the priest, see people receiving Holy Communion or receive a blessing if we have not made our First Holy Communion yet, etc.)

Wednesday: Life to the Full in Our Families

'The Lord trusts that young people, through their relationships with the elderly, will realise that they are called to cultivate memory and recognise the beauty of being part of a much larger history. Friendship with an older person can help the young to see life not only in terms of the present and realise that not everything depends on them and their abilities. For the elderly, the presence of a young person in their lives can give them hope that their experience will not be lost and that their dreams can find fulfilment.' Background for Teacher

Today we celebrate the gift of each member of our family, with a particular focus on grandparents and the grandparenting generation. We give thanks to God for the gift of grandparents and ask God's blessing on them, particularly in their role in handing on the gift of faith. Grandparents are often the people who can help nurture the soul place of spiritual being – the connection with our divine purpose in God who is at the heart of each one of us.



Connecting with Scripture

Consider

Grandparents have a special role to play in sharing friendship across generations. They find common ground that all can enjoy. They encourage children to be their best selves through love shared and time given.



Story

Grandpa Billy was looking forward to seeing his grandchildren after school. They always had lots of fun in Grandpa's house. Grandpa Billy's house was beside a big river where the swans and ducks swam by each day. Grandpa Billy often told the children about how he swam in the river when he was a boy. Leena and Jeevan loved to hear Billy's stories and to help him when he was building their playhouse or shelves for their books or toys.

When they were with Grandpa Billy, Jeevan loved to tell him about his day in school, about who he played with in the yard and what he made in art. Leena liked to go down to the river with Grandpa to skim stones and sing songs as she pretended to row a boat and watched the canoes go by. The children both learned how to fish, to help fix furniture and to know the names of the many different plants in Grandpa's beautiful garden.

Grandpa Billy helped in his parish church. Leena and Jeevan often went with him when he was fixing furniture or doors in the church and helped carry the tools for him. They usually lit a candle with Grandpa's help when they were there.



Connecting with Scripture

Consider

Take time to consider how diversity makes our school a better place and brings the world into our classrooms.

Explore

Take note of the diversity in your own classroom.

Discuss

- How many languages are spoken by children in your classroom?
- How do you say Hello and/or Welcome in each of these languages?
- Take time to allow every person to name one thing that they are really good at.
- What difference does it make when we are all good at different things?
- What would it be like if we were all exactly the same?
- What is good about us all being different from one another?

Activity

Make a poster with the word *Hello* or *Welcome* written in each language spoken by children in the classroom.



Connecting with Scripture

Consider

How to increase plant diversity and pollen sources in the school environment.

Story

God created a beautiful world with all that we need for food, shelter and heat provided for us. God has given every person and every creature special jobs to do in the world. Bees are one of those creatures with very special and important jobs to do in the world! Let's hear what Berta Bee does.

Berta Bee loved the bright sunny day as she buzzed from flower to flower in the garden. She flicked her tongue into centre of the flowers and took out the nectar to make honey. The pollen got stuck on her body as she moved from flower to flower. The sticky pollen rubbed off on other flowers. Berta loved to spread the pollen, as she knew that the spreading of pollen would make more flowers grow. Berta and all her bee friends need lots of flowers to make enough honey and keep the world full of beautiful flowers and plants. Bees are really good friends and gardeners for people. People need Berta and her friends to do their job spreading pollen so that there will be enough plants to provide food and enough flowers to keep our world bright and beautiful.

Discuss

- Who created the world for us?
- What kind of world did God make for us?
- Name some animals that God created?
- Name some flowers and plants that God created?
- What did Berta like to do?
- What did she do with the pollen?
- What does the pollen do?
- What can we do to provide more flowers and plants for Berta and her friends?

Activity

Sow some wild flowers in the school garden, or in containers, to increase the food and pollen sources for the bees in summer time.
