Monday: Life to the Full in Our Community of Friends

In the safe and productive school environment, each member of the school community may realise afresh, as Pope Francis wrote, that: 'Christ is alive! He is our hope, and in a wonderful way he brings youth to our world, and everything he touches becomes young, new, full of life. The very first words, then, that I would like to say to every young Christian are these: Christ is alive and he wants you to be alive!' (*Christus Vivit*, I).

Background for Teacher

Children's experience of community begins in the home and school, as does their experience of God. The values of the gospel nourished in the home and school, along with the examples given by Jesus of kindness, love, forgiveness and acceptance, challenge them to be their best selves. Followers of Jesus are called into community to be connected with one another through love. The gospel calls us into a community where all can grow in mental, physical and spiritual wellness so that each of us has the readiness and openness to grow towards greater wholeness every day of life.

The nurturing of relationships with ourselves, with those whom we encounter daily and with God forms the foundation for supporting personal growth at all levels.

Connecting with Scripture

'A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.' (Jn 13:34-35)



Consider

Our class is a community of friends where we learn, play and pray together. God wants us to care for one another because we are each precious to God.

Explore

- What does it mean to be a caring friend?
- How do we care for one another in our class?
- Can you name a time when someone showed care for you?
- What difference did it make to you when care was shown to you?
- God wants us to be good friends. How can we be more caring friends here in our class?

Prayer

Sit together in a circle as friends. Place a light in the centre representing Jesus, who connects us together as his friends. Make the Sign of the Cross.

Teacher: We are friends together when we care for one another.

Response: Thank you, God, for my friends.

Conclude with the Sign of the Cross.

Teacher: Each person will say their name in turn and we will then say 'Thank you, God' for each person by name.

Each person in the classroom will take a turn to say their name: 'My name is _____.'

After each says their name all will respond with: 'Thank you, God, for ____.' **Song:** 'Grow in Love' (*Grow in Love: Junior Infants/Primary 1 Teacher's Manual*, p. 150)

Tuesday: Life to the Full in Our Faith Community

'[The parish] is the normal environment where we learned to hear the Gospel, to know the Lord Jesus, to serve with gratuitousness, to pray in community, to share projects and initiatives, to feel part of God's holy people.' (Pope Francis, 29 October 2022)

Background for Teacher

We pray on our own to God, at home and in school. Home and school are connected to the parish community where we are called together as friends of Jesus. When we gather in the church we celebrate being together, we say sorry for what we may have done wrong, we give praise to God, we hear God speak to us through the scriptures and we share in sacrifice as Jesus makes himself present through the offering of bread and wine on the altar. We open our hearts to welcome God so that we can bring God's hope and love out into our homes, our schools and all the other places where we are each week. We each have a part to play to make a difference in our parish faith community.

Our spiritual well-being is nourished at the heart of the parish gatherings and celebrations.

Connecting with Scripture

Consider


We are part of our parish community. God calls us to be together because we are part of God's family.

Explore:

- Who are the people that you see in the church? (Perhaps the priest, readers, ministers of the Eucharist, choir, altar servers, sacristan, catechist, cleaners, secretary, etc.)
- What do you see people doing in the church? (Praying, talking, singing, listening, cleaning, etc.)
- The parish church is a special place where God's friends gather together. How do you think God feels when we are all together praying and singing in the church?

Activity

Draw a picture of yourself and colour the candle on the card. Bring the card to the church so that the people who pray there each day will pray for you this week. (Children's names should not be on the card.)



Wednesday: Life to the Full in Our Families

'I invite you to continue your journey by listening to the Father who calls you: become missionaries in the ways of the world! Do not walk alone! You, young families, be guided by those who know the way, you who are further along, be companions on the journey for others.' (Pope Francis, World Meeting of Families, 25 June 2022)



Family is the basic cell of all community groups – school, parish, etc. Children learn their first values in the home from what are priorities for their parents and grandparents.

On this particular day we give attention to grandparents and the role they play in the lives of families and children. Grandparents support parents in their role and are important in the lives of each child. Each generation has an important gift to pass onto the next generation, including the gift of faith in God.

Teachers should use their discretion in relation to these activities if pupils have recently lost grandparents or are not in contact with grandparents. All classes can engage with the following activities at different levels.


Explore

Thursday: Life to the Full, for and with Others

[Catholic religious education] promotes the value of respect for religious diversity and cultural difference, combating prejudice and discrimination, and contributing to the promotion of tolerance and interfaith harmony in society. Background for Teacher

Social justice, inclusion and diversity are at the core of gospel values. Jesus crossed all the boundaries of this time when he touched those with contagious skin diseases, spoke with those who had broken the law forgiving those who were sorry, spoke with those from Samaria who were scorned by the Pharisees and leaders and challenged those leaders who were not treating people fairly. As followers of Jesus, we are called to stand with courage against prejudice, to speak for those who have no power, to make place for those in need and to treat all in our company with due respect. Our schools have always been places of a diversity of needs and cultures and are even more so now - we are called to respond with the open heart of Jesus so that differences are understood as gifts that add to our culture and lives.





Connecting with Scripture

'God saw all that he had made, and it was very good.' (Gn 1:31)



Consider

How to increase plant diversity and pollen sources in the school environment.

Story

The brothers Flippy and Floppy Rabbit lived in a burrow in a hill. The burrow was big enough for both rabbits to sleep, eat and stay warm. Flippy and Floppy loved to eat carrots, which they dug in a garden near the hill. Sometimes they ate the carrots while they were in the garden and then carried some back to the burrow to eat later. Flippy always put the carrots in a tidy pile at the back of the burrow. Floppy put his carrots inside the opening of the burrow; he put carrots in the bed where they slept and he put carrots outside the burrow. Floppy just left carrots everywhere! Sometimes there wasn't even room to get into the borrow because carrots were stacked here and there and the bed was uncomfortable when it was full of carrots. Flippy was not happy when this happened! He would beat the ground with his paws when cross and push Floppy with his nose. Floppy wasn't happy when they were fighting with one another!

Discussion

- Would you like to live with Floppy Rabbit?
- Was Floppy a tidy rabbit?
- Were they happy rabbits?
- Which rabbit do you think you might be like?
- What can we learn from Flippy and Floppy?
- How do we care for our classroom and home?
